Michael A. Gimbrone, Jr, MD, recently received the Bristol-Myers Squibb Award For Distinguished

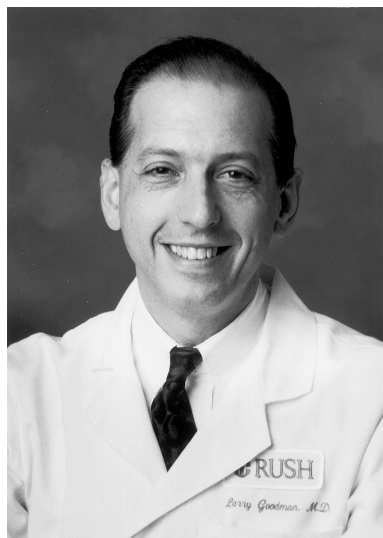
Achievement in Cardiovascular Research. Dr Gimbrone is widely regarded as a pioneer in vascular biology, particularly regarding the function of endothelial cells in health and disease. He is the Elsie T. Friedman Professor of Pathology at Harvard Medical School and Chair of the Department of Pathology and Director of the Center of Excellence in Vascular Biology at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

Dr Gimbrone graduated magna cum laude (Honors Thesis) with his MD from Harvard Medical School in 1970. He then served an internship at Massachusetts General Hospital and a research fellowship at Children's Hospital Medical Center, Boston. He held the position of Staff Associate at the National Cancer Institute and completed a residency in pathology at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston. There, he

began the Vascular Pathophysiology Research Laboratory, which later became the Vascular Research Division of the Department of Pathology at Brigham and Women's Hospital.

He has served on numerous editorial boards and is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the Institute of Medicine, and the National Academy of Sciences. His many awards received include the Established Investigatorship Award and the 1993 Basic Research Prize from the American Heart Association, the MERIT Award from the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (1994), and the J. Allyn Taylor International Prize in Medicine (together with Dr Judah Folkman) for distinguished lifetime achievement in the field of Vascular Biology (1999).

Larry J. Goodman Appointed Dean of Rush Medical College

Larry J. Goodman, MD, has been named Dean of Rush Medical College and Henry P. Russe Professor. Dr Goodman, who is currently Senior Vice President of Medical Affairs at Rush, had served as Acting Dean since January of 2000 and has been affiliated with the college for more than 20 years.

Dr Goodman graduated with his MD from the University of Michigan Medical School in 1976 and served his internship in internal medicine at Rush-Presbyterian-St Luke's Medical Center from 1976 to 1977. He subsequently completed a residency in internal medicine and a fellowship in infectious diseases at Rush-Presbyterian-St Luke's

and was Chief Medical Resident for 1 year while there.

He joined Rush Medical College in 1979 as an Instructor in Medicine and worked his way through the ranks, being named Professor of Medicine in 1995. Meanwhile, Dr Goodman held a number of administrative positions, including Assistant Dean of Clinical Curriculum from 1982 to 1987, Acting Associate Dean from 1986 to 1987, and Associate Dean of Medical Student Programs from 1987 to 1996. He also served as Director of the Division of Specialized Training Programs from 1993 to 1996 and Director of Interinstitutional Affairs for Medical Affairs from 1994 to 1996. He was named
